

I was baptized, had my first communion, and was confirmed at St. Helena's Catholic Church in Ellendale. When my wife and I got married, we decided to both worship at St. John's Lutheran in Jamestown. People are surprised that I grew up

Roman Catholic and that I am where I am today. It certainly surprised my parents, but they are ok with it because 1) I still have faith, 2) I am going to church, and 3) my kids come too.

I teach K-12 Physical Education in the Medina Public School, I coached for eight seasons, and continue to officiate football and basketball games. Spring is my "off season."

I found my faith at a young age through my parents. My dad is a faithful person and even going back to my grandparents, faith has been a priority for life. I remember as a young elementary school boy, that my Grandfather's funeral bulletin had symbols representing Faith, Family, and Agriculture. I remember the explanation that these things were all important to him. I remember going on family driving vacations and always going to church on Sunday, wherever we were. That exposed me to the variety of people and places that people worship.

I am very attentive to teaching kids, especially my own, about generosity and kindness- How to be a good human. Ultimately it is not being good at sports or academics that will be the most important but how you treat people. My son's class had a penny collection challenge with other classes to benefit someone in need- some were competitive and wanted to win the penny drive- my son spoke up that it was not about the money but about helping others that mattered. As a teacher, I try to remind my classes that inclusion in activities is important.

One of my favorite Bible stories is Daniel and the Lion's Den. As I get older, I identify the lions in life that are walking all around me: stress, work, distractions. You can get thrown into situations and can always find a reason or find something that God may be trying to teach you. It can be an "aha" moment to have the courage and faith to see that God is with us through it all.

I believe that we have a purpose, that God put us here for a reason. We are part of one big story and in that story are different chapters in life. There are things to learn in each chapter: growing up, going to school, getting married and having a family.

I pray for my family. I give thanks for them and I pray for their health and relationships. We continue to be active with each other, but I can see that middle school is just around the corner and I pray that my kids have the strength and proper tools to handle the things that come up. I struggle with perfection- that is I don't always let myself recognize that I am who I am. I sometimes try to be other people or have what other people have.

If I could go back and change something, it would be to be more involved with service missions when I was in high school and college. Looking back I tended to indulge myself rather than serve.

I'm a Lutheran because that's what my wife and I agreed when we got married. This is the place where my family chooses to worship. For me music is soothing. It calms me, but it also can be a motivation for me. A good song can get me going for the whole day. Music helps pass the time but also provides purpose.

Traveling has taught me that the world is a struggling place. You can see so many things outside of North Dakota. You can see the needs and the ways that people live.

Serving on a community team has opened my eyes to the many different view points that there are in communities and the different types of personalities that people have. I have also appreciated getting to meet people of different generations. I am interested in the heritage of how things used to be. I see ways that old things can be adapted to our time.

Seasons of Life in the Church

When Kayla Rexine and Logan Hanson visited Trinity for the first time they were dating and they kept coming back! Kayla told the pastors they were looking for a church where they could get involved. By the time they had started helping to prepare Communion on Sunday mornings they weren't dating anymore, they were engaged. On a beautiful summer day in June of 2019 they were married and served Holy Communion to their wedding guests from the same communion set they had filled together for Communion at Trinity.

Kayla and Logan, an auctioneer, helped plan a fundraising event that would help raise funds for a new roof over the Education wing at Trinity. The Raise the Roof Auction was planned for Sunday, March 29, 2020 ... and then Covid-19 cancelled everything. In the fall of 2021, Logan and Kayla volunteered to make the Raise the Roof Auction finally happen, even though Kayla would be 8 months pregnant with their first child!

In January, on Baptism of Our Lord Sunday, little Eden Bernice Hanson, just 19 days old, was baptized at Trinity Lutheran. Representing the whole Christian church, members of Trinity promised to "support her and pray for her in her new life in Christ." The whole congregation welcomed Eden "into the body of Christ and into the mission we share". Eden won't remember all of that but her parents will tell her about that special day as she grows up. They will tell her who attended her baptism, who her sponsors were, and how they gathered in the Fellowship Hall after church to celebrate. The same Fellowship Hall where her parents, just a month before she was born, helped raise \$3,000 for the education roof at Trinity.

The faith community that Logan and Kayla joined has prayed for and supported them through several seasons in their lives. Throughout those seasons Eden's parents have been actively involved in the body of Christ and in the mission we share. When we live together in the body of Christ our seasons of life and the seasons of the congregation's life intertwine. One day Eden may learn about Baptism and Holy Communion and being a part of the body of Christ under a new education wing roof that her parents helped to build.

Eastern North Dakota Synod News

Synod Council

The Synod Council is the board of directors for the Eastern North Dakota (EaND) Synod. The Synod Council consists of members elected from each conference (one rostered and on lay representative), three executive positions, a multi-cultural representative, a youth representative and the president of the Eastern ND WELCA. Each person elected to the Synod Council shall be a voting member of a congregation of the EaND Synod, with the exception of ordained ministers on the roster of this synod who reside outside the territory of the synod. (See the Constitution, Bylaws, and Continuing Resolutions of the EaND Synod)

Synod Council meetings are scheduled in June in conjunction with synod assembly, and in the fall. The council is responsible for the business of the synod between yearly synod assemblies.

Jon Lillejord of Trinity, Jamestown, and Pastor Nathan Wicks of Emmanuel, Gackle, serve on behalf of the congregations in the Jamestown Conference.

Discernment Process among South Central North Dakota ELCA Congregations

Overview

The Planning Team is in the middle of months that focus on communication and developing options for the eight congregations.

Half the planning team members are on the Presentation and Listening Team. They have travelled in groups to visit each congregation. Their purpose is to share what was heard during the January/ February listening sessions. They will also continue to listen to how each congregation responds to the topics and concerns raised by other congregations. Each congregation has been visited once by this team.

The other half of the planning team members are on the Options Team. They will use the information shared in the listening sessions to develop a set of options that will be presented to the congregations. After additional feedback, they will refine the options. Following a meeting of both teams on March 15, it was decided to direct additional time and efforts into developing additional viable options. To allow time for this work, the timeline for second visits from the Presentation and Listening Team has been adjusted.

Adjusted Timeline

January 16-February 10—Video presentation and initial listening sessions with each congregation February 16—March 20— Presentation and Listening Team visits each congregation

March 16—April 19—All Planning Team members working on developing multiple viable options

April 20—May 18—First set of Options will be presented to each congregation for feedback

May 20—June—Refined options and a recommendation from the Planning Team will be presented to each congregation. Congregations will be asked to decide whether or not to continue as they are or to accept the recommended option(s) and begin implementing those plans.

Next Steps

When dates are announced for visits from the Presentation and Listening Team, please plan to participate. Expect the next opportunities to be after Easter.


Every option being developed will share these core values:

Palms to Cross to New Life

As our Lenten pilgrimage comes to an end this year, we enter one more time into the mystery of the death and resurrection of Jesus. There are so many places in the story that invite us in - to imagine the joy, sorrow, and confusion of those days. Where do you find yourself standing this year? Jesus approaches Jerusalem and there is a buzz in the city and the crowds gather. Cloaks are thrown into the street to line the path to David's royal city. Palm branches wave in the air as the people greet the one they hope will become king. Stand with the crowds and shout Hosanna on Palm Sunday. What do you hope for? What do you long for? Who do you look to as a leader? Some people, including some of the disciples, thought that

Jesus becoming King would be a good thing, a solution, to years of oppression and occupation. Who today doesn't take that line at times, "If people would only follow Jesus, everything would be ok." What do you think?

Days after Jesus comes to Jerusalem, there is another energy in the city. Jesus has been arrested, and people gather outside the fortress of the Roman Governor. If Jesus won't put up a fight-maybe the resistance leader Barabbas will. "Give us Barabbas," the people cry. And we cry out with them. We lend our voices to the wisdom of the crowd. How often today do we continue to follow the crowd and forget that Jesus leads in a new way. The crowds follow Jesus to the hill where he is hung on the cross, and then melt away. Where do we turn when death and pain surround us? Jesus dies and his body is sealed in a hole in the ground. We all know the pain of broken expectations, the past few years have sometimes seemed like a never-ending series of plans and cancelations. The hopes and dreams that lifted the hearts of the people on Palm Sunday, were pierced and deflated. The crowd will always find something new to follow. How do we linger in the midst of our grief and be open to the reality of the brokenness around us? Do we stay at the foot of the cross, or walk away?

Easter morning breaks with confusing news: the tomb is empty! As we celebrate the resurrection this year, we remember that Jesus meets us on the way. Jesus seeks out the ones who walked away from the cross and headed home to Emmaus. Jesus entered the locked room and offered himself to other gathered disciples. Jesus is alive and offers that new life to us. How do we respond to the gift of new life in Christ Jesus this year? First and foremost, we give thanks to God for God's faithfulness and love that continues to be poured out on us today. The Living Christ is seen in the face of our neighbors and we continue to serve Christ in what we say and do. In the midst of our joy, sorrow, and confusion Jesus offers a word of assurance: I will be with you always. Happy Easter.



COUNCIL HIGHLIGHT

The first hour of the council meeting included a visit from the Presentation and Listening team of the Discernment Group. About 25 people were present for the conversation as we reviewed what St. John's has said is important for the future and what the other seven congregations lifted up. A follow-up visit will be scheduled when some options are developed..

As the council transitioned to a smaller meeting, President Lynn asked us to check in on our homework of reflecting on how we feel when we come to St. John's.

Council updates: the new doors are in the process of being manufactured with installation this spring. St. John's renewed the partnership agreement through August for pastoral services with English Lutheran in Medina and Trinity Lutheran. Financials were reviewed.

There comes a time...

As the author of Ecclesiastes tells us, "there is a time for every purpose under heaven." There is a time to collect and build up, and a time to tear down and cast away. Sooner or later the time comes when you no longer need all that you have built and collected.

There comes a time when you no longer need the house you once lived in. There comes a time when that vacation home or winter retreat is no longer the source of refuge and recreation it once was. There comes a time when the kids and grandkids decide they don't want the family farm,

business or cabin. There comes a time when you realize your retirement savings will likely outlive you.

When that time comes, what will happen next?

Being prepared is important if you want your life's work to still have meaning and purpose even when the time comes to let it go. Having a good strong plan in place will be essential to passing along not only your wealth and possessions, but the story of who you were and what was most important to you.

Will you leave it to chance, or will you have a plan?

Many people don't think they need a plan. They think a few verbal instructions or a simple will covers things. They underestimate the complexity of what happens after you die. Without a proper plan you can leave your loved ones with a rat's nest of details to be sorted out. And if a clear plan is not in place it is likely that the courts will have to get involved (probate), causing more delays, more work for your heirs, and more costs.
