



I was baptized and confirmed at St. Olaf Lutheran Church in Devils Lake. As a high schooler, my family joined a mission start in town. In my early working years we moved often and I was a part of 3 different congregations in

five years before settling in New Rockford for five years. Another move took me to Valley City, where I worshiped at Our Savior's Lutheran and for the past two decades or so, I have been a member at Trinity Lutheran. I really found my faith in High School at the mission start with Pastor Bob Weber (not related to the current pastors Weber). Pastor Bob is near the top the list of people who have most influenced my life.

By profession, I am an educator. After five years in a classroom, I moved to administration. I was a High School principal for 20 years and then served as an assistant Superintendent and then Superintendent of Jamestown Public Schools. I retired, and stayed retired for seven years before answering a call two years ago to be the Superintendent of the Pingree-Buchanan school district.

Throughout my life I have been an advocate for education and educators. One of my favorite sayings is, "when you teach you touch the future." More recently I have been fighting for how we treat immigrants and minorities. Three of my grandparents were born in Norway, and I remember lots of Norwegian spoken at home and at family gatherings. It bothers be that people look down at new immigrants who continue to speak their native language and expect that they will speak English right away. People in my family came and received free or very inexpensive land and settled in places near others from their home country. People today are over concerned that immigrants come for hand-outs. Different types of support has been available for different people over the years.

My favorite bible verse is 1 Corinthians 13:13 "And now faith, hope, and love abide, these

three; and the greatest of these is love." This was a reading at my wedding and a reading at the weddings of my daughters. I pray for peace. I see what goes on in the world and it is often not pretty. A reference once said of me, "Mr. Toso doesn't like conflict." And that is true, but I also know that once I'm in a conflict, I work hard to identify my own bottom line. Now that my grandkids are starting to finish high school, I realize that I'm praying for them often.

I struggle with our current political environment; especially how negative it is. I also worry about what is happening with institutions including the church. People are surprised that I was pretty motivated politically throughout college including chairing the college Republicans at VCSU and running for the state legislature years ago.

I'm a Lutheran because my parents were Lutherans and it is a family tradition. I do believe that Martin Luther hit the nail on the head when he lifted up Justification by Faith. Good works are not an end in themselves, but an outgrowth of Faith.

For me, music is relaxing and uplifting. I enjoy concerts and am active in the church choir. I am not a particularly gifted singer, and don't play any other instrument or even read music well, but so far, every music director has put up with me. During the summer between my junior and senior year of college, a group of churches in Devils Lake started a youth singing group. My brother and a friend joined right away, but I was busy playing golf and did not join for a while. When I did join, I enjoyed it. We sang in various churches on Sundays or at homes for the elderly. One of the other singers was a cute blonde. We started dating in November and were engaged by January. The next August, we were married. We will celebrate 49 years of marriage next August. One more reason music has been important. I never would have met Lainie without it.

Serving on the church council and numerous community boards opened my eyes to the need to prioritize. There are always more needs than there is money to go around. Prioritization makes sure that resources are going to the right destination and that is not possible if you don't see the big picture.

Commodity Supplemental Food Program Assists those who are Hungry

Anyone who has stepped foot in a grocery store knows that food prices have been going up.

As household budgets get stretched, there is help available. Every other month a big truck comes to Jamestown with shelf-stable food that is available for free to those who are 60+ years of age and meet certain requirements. A dedicated group of volunteers breaks down the pallets of boxes for pick-up or home delivery. This program has been available in the region for over five years and consistently provides 55-65 people with food. There is room to grow.

We strive to help people of all backgrounds shine with the light of Jesus Christ in every aspect of life.

Lutheran Disaster Response

On December 30, the Marshall Fire ignited in Boulder County, Colorado. Over 6,200 acres burned quickly, forcing the evacuations of 35,000 people. The fire destroyed close to 1000 homes. Lutheran Disaster Response is collaborating with the Rocky Mountain Synod and Lutheran Social Services of the Rocky Mountains to respond to the needs in these communities.

On the night of Dec. 10, a devastating outbreak of more than 30 tornadoes swept through six states. Kentucky was impacted the most, with more than 70 people reported dead. Homes and businesses were destroyed, including a candle factory in Mayfield, Kentucky. Lutheran Disaster Response is engaging with partners in the affected areas, including the Indiana-Kentucky Synod, to respond to immediate needs.

Discernment Process among South Central North Dakota ELCA Congregations

Overview

At its second meeting, the Area Ministry Planning Team worked toward coming to an agreement on where to focus their energies and where to begin. Their work on developing this focus was rooted in what they had already talked about at the first meeting and in an honest assessment of the current realities facing them.

Current Realities

It is worth noting that the strength of the team is seen in the variety and diversity of experience amongst its members. It also is found in a willingness to work together and a commitment to the church. At the same time, the team is limited and challenged by time constraints, the reality of burnout, and the hesitancy to speak without first consulting the congregation.

The team expects that together our congregations will be stronger, spark participation, reduce stress, and be more stable. However, going forward and being successful could result in some members leaving, stretching pastors thin, and confusion (in particular around technology).

Focus Questions

The team began to work on identifying the questions they need to address. The questions they came up with fall into six general areas:

The role of the pastor

What is available for pastoral services and the needs of congregations

A vision for success - what it looks like, how much time is needed, and what is church?

The options for change - understanding what can and can not and what should and should not change Finances

6. Alignment – how can we work with varying congregations depending upon our needs

Next Meeting

The team expressed their interest in seeing and understanding the pastor situation in the area. They would like to review the current pool of pastoral leaders, where they are located, how they are committed or called. With this, there will also be a review of the current pastoral and staffing needs across all of the congregations. This would include needs related to worship, pastoral care, education, and general leadership. Pastor Soli will gather this data in preparation for the next meeting which is January 18th.

Video Project

Representatives will be making a short video about what they and their congregation hope and pray for in regards to the discernment process. This video will be available to show at annual meetings.

NRSVue

Every week I read the bible. I read in preparation of a sermon. I read in public worship. I read in devotional moments. I care deeply about God's word and pay attention to the Bibles that I use. Yes, Bibles. Not all translations of the Bible are the same. All translations convey a part of the theology and world view of the ones making the translation. So, I use different bibles at different times. Sometimes I even read different translations side by side to listen to the different ways that God's word is brought to life.

In worship, we most often use the New Revised Standard Version translation of the Bible which was first published in 1989. Over the decades, small changes have been made to the text, a tweak here, a revision there. But after over 30 years, the National Council of Churches of Christ in the U.S.A. (NCC) commissioned the Society of Biblical Literature (SBL) to review and update the NRSV. The October 14 press release from the NCC says that the update "follows in the tradition of the King James Bible, making changes that were warranted on the basis of accuracy, clarity, euphony, and current English usage."

The new updated edition is so significantly different that it calls for a new name. And because the *New* New Revised Standard Version seems a bit silly, we now have the NRSVue (updated edition). The NRSVue is available today as an ebook and we will soon see printed translations become available. It will take time for the new translation to work its way into our worship and devotional lives, but it is coming.

Translations change because language changes. Translations change because our awareness of how language reflects and shapes attitudes change. I watch some of the old shows on MeTV and often cringe at the jokes or portrayal of women, people with disabilities, or people of color. I try to speak with and to people as I would want them to speak to me. Updated translations offer us a new way to hear God speaking to us in the language of our day.

You can easily search online for some examples of specific changes if you are interested. Or like me, you could wait and encounter God's word as it comes, possibly in an unexpected way, when you least expect it. There is nothing wrong with our existing NRSV's and they will be around on shelves for years to come (as evidenced by the remnant of the RSV's on various shelves around St. John's). As you encounter some of the language that is familiar, but maybe a little different, ask yourself, is God's voice entering the world in a new way for the next generation to hear it? How is God's Word heard anew this day?

Council Highlights

The council reviewed the year end financials of St. John's and amended the proposed 2022 Mission and ministry Plan.

2021 General Fund Income: \$337,7312021 General Fund Expenses: \$335,089

2022 Proposed Income: \$345,000

2022 Proposed Expenses: \$316,000

Very strong December giving surpassed expectations. The generosity of members continues, even as the frequency and type of gifts evolves. More people are using direct distributions from retirement plans, which arrive in one large check. This makes our monthly income numbers lower in months when those distributions don't happen.


The council reviewed the Nominating committee ballot, and drafted an agenda for the annual meeting on Feb. 6th.

The council is waiting for the Discernment Process report before making staff configuration recommendations.

The council reviewed identified volunteer and/or paid positions to cover gaps that affect ministry including: a coordinator of volunteers, Friday The Council agreed to end our status as a Chartering Organization for Pack 135 of Scouts BSA (Boy Scouts). The pack is not currently meeting and has not had a St. John's participant for years.

The council heard an update on design work for the kitchen. Plans are being revised and will soon be ready for releasing to contractors for bids.
