Dear friends in Christ,

Recently, I read an article that discussed an increase in prayer and religious beliefs in the United States after nearly three decades of decreases. It theorized that this has been spurred by the COVID-19 pandemic, racial and political unrest,

and economic concerns. I did some research and found that 100 years, 1920, looked very similar to 2020. A resurgence in religious beliefs was brought about by the recently ended world war, a devastating pandemic, a revival of the Ku Klux Klan, and the red scare (fear that the US was also on the verge of revolution). As I continued to read, I was struck by just how similar we are to 100 years ago.

In 1920, peaceful protests led by the NAACP to call attention to "the never-ending wrong" erupted into race riots in Tulsa Oklahoma that claimed the lives of 250 Americans and caused \$1.5 million in damaged

In 2020 the peaceful protests led by the BLM and others erupted into race riots around the country claiming lives and injuring many in addition to causing millions of dollars in damage to public and private property.

I could continue but I think I made my point. We have not learned from the mistakes of our past. Will the next century be different? Will our children, grandchildren, and great grandchildren be the generations to bring us out of this cycle of history repeating itself? It would be interesting to see what the year 2120 would be like...Or maybe not.

A PEW research study shows that in 1990 approximately 7% of those surveyed did not identify with any organized religion. By 2018 that had grown to 27%. The research pointed to changes in social norms such as marriage and divorce as well government policies that discourage religious beliefs. Why does it take a crisis of epic proportions to bring us back to God?

Lutheran Social Services of North Dakota announced on January 14th that they are suspending programs and beginning a controlled liquidation plan.

This announcement completely surprised me and has created questions, some of which will never be answered completely. Make no mistake, this is a huge loss for our state and is a loss for shared ministry across the Eastern and Western North Dakota Synods. LSS was our ministry partner and this liquidation will ripple to every corner of North Dakota. The presenting issue lifted up in the press release is the financial difficulties faced by LSS Housing. People far more connected than I am might know more specifics, but this much is clear: no organization or institution is immune to sudden shifts in demand, changes in the financial health of ministry partners, and debt repayment schedules.

Another stark reality is that just because you've been around for a long time and do good work, doesn't mean that you can't stumble or even fall. I am much more familiar with congregations closing and liquidating assets. This is much bigger and just as painful.

About 20 years ago a group of congregations on the north side of Chicago sold all of their buildings and joined together in a new congregation in a renovated two story office building. They continued in ministry for another decade or so before closing. The people in the congregation were sad that the time had come to end their ministry, but they reflected a sense of hope and gratitude that the ministry had not been in vain. They celebrated the decade of vital ministry that came out of three congregations that were too tired and underfunded to continue alone.

101 years ago, a group of Lutherans organized a society to care for orphans and at-risk children. That organization grew into Lutheran Social Services and expanded to meet the needs of people across the state. We can look back and celebrate all of the lives that have been impacted by the work of Lutherans in North Dakota. There will continue to be Lutherans in North Dakota for generations and we will continue to serve and be the hands of Christ at work in the world, but our reach has been clipped. Expertise, coordination, and statewide vision are being lost.

We thank and offer support to the 283 employees of LSS who are losing their jobs in positions in which they dedicated years of their lives in service to others. We recognize the uncertainty and potential loss of programs that we know and depend on, even if we didn't know they were connected to LSS- such as Child Care Aware (that provided high quality training materials used by Child in Our Hands), the Retired Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP), the Legacy Center, and Abound Counseling, to name just a few of the local connections. When you come across someone with a LSS connection, be sure to offer words of encouragement, "Well done, good and faithful servant."

Fiends,

As we are in the middle of winter we are experiencing shorter day light. Yet, our long nights are getting shorter. As I am writing this, our COVID-19 infections have been steadily decreasing, our political leadership will experience stability, and more people are getting or will have access to the vaccine. Thinking back to last year, I remembered that St Johns had a fire in January which seems like ages ago. A lot has happened this past year and it shows one central thing, how resilient our congregation is. Through this pandemic time, we have learned the importance of

face to face interactions which can never be substituted. As a church, however, we have adjusted and improvement to reach people and extend our reach for the good news of the gospel.

As I am reminded of the amount of discipleship our church has enacted I think about the story from Matthew 4:18-22, Jesus calling the first disciples:

"As he [Jesus] walked by the Sea of Galilee, he saw two brothers, Simon, who is called Peter, and Andrew his brother, casting a net into the sea—for they were fishermen. And he said to them, 'Follow me, and I will make you fish for people.' Immediately they left their nets and followed him. As he went from there, he saw two other brothers, James son of Zebedee and his brother John, in the boat with their father Zebedee, mending their nets, and he called them. Immediately they left the boat and their father, and followed him."

To be a disciple of Jesus, we need to continually adjust and reach the needs of the community even if COVID-19 never existed. The time of "we have always done it this way" is past us and not coming back. Peter had been a fisherman his whole life, but then Jesus shows up and changes his call and it changes into a profession in ministry and a life of discipleship.

Even though it seems like things are slowly starting to return "to normal," our ministry will not be like what it was before March 2020. After all, we have created a food program, Come to The Table, that we hope will be a long-term act of service to our community that started as a result of COVID-19. We can imagine and find our ways in our community where we can "fish for people." This calling isn't an easy one as you need to be willing to find the time to serve someone you may not know. However, God gives us the fishing pole of grace and the nets of faith to help us reach our neighbor and beyond as we travel together in the newness of each day.

Lutheran Social Services of North Dakota — a non-profit agency with predecessor organizations dating to 1919 - 1

The agency's Board of Directors, after accepting reports from staff leadership, external advisers and legal counsel, passed a resolution that confirms actions leading to a liquidation, including a bankruptcy filing, if necessary.

The decision was driven in large part by continued struggles of Lutheran Social Services Housing, an affiliated program. LSS Housing, which started in 2009, impacted agency reserves and resulted in negative cash flow projections, according to Bob Otterson, who started Dec. 1, 2020, as the agency's president and chief executive officer. "LSS Housing in recent years has been draining the reserves of the affiliated agency," Otterson said. "This financial pressure has hampered the ability of an essential, faith-based organization to serve its clients, specifically those in primary mission areas such as services to children, families, seniors and others."

The action affects employment of 283 full-time and part-time staff and several long-term contractors. LSS North Dakota leaders have informed employees about what they can expect in the coming days. Similarly, professionals in mental health and behavioral health programs are working with their clients on options for referrals and other services, Otterson said.

The issues came to a head early this week, Otterson said. "While developing a systematic exit from the housing market, agency leaders and external advisers determined over the past six weeks that the agency's financial health had been compromised to the point where a positive cash flow has become unachievable in the next six months," Otterson said. The board's directors, in their deliberations, acknowledged that decisions made two, four, even 10 years ago, created the financial crisis that has forced a bankruptcy resolution, according to Murray Sagsveen, the board's chairman.

"Obvious economic realities — such as the downturn in oil production and a global pandemic — have been factors in this outcome," Sagsveen said. "However, the primary factors remain the LSS Housing business model, its accumulated debt, its inability to cover its expenses and other agency-level decisions made in previous years."

"The agency has lived up to its mission of bringing healing, help and hope to neighbors," Otterson said. "Unfortunately some chronic financial issues have forced the actions of this very difficult day."

LSS Housing was created to address the need for affordable housing in communities across the state, particularly as demand was driving up housing costs in oil-producing areas of western North Dakota. Further study noted the housing needs of people on fixed incomes across the state. LSSND invested more about \$16 million in cash and secured additional funding that provided safe sustaining housing for hundreds of families, seniors and individuals. LSS Housing owns and operates 22 properties in 14 communities and manages another 14 residential properties in 10 communities.

Dear Lutheran siblings of North Dakota,

As Bishops of our Eastern and Western North Dakota Synods, it grieves us to share with you the difficult news of the closure of a key Lutheran partner in ministry. Lutheran Social Services of North Dakota, after 101 years of important ministry, has reached the end of its life as a faith-based service organization in our midst.

Lutheran Social Services has extended caring ministries that have often grown from congregational input and support. They have provided healing, help, and hope across the state, especially among vulnerable populations such as children, families, seniors, and New Americans.

We cannot at this time fully imagine the loss that this closure represents. Important ministries and services will be discontinued. Lutheran Social Services of North Dakota will no longer be able to live out their faith-based mission to offer healing, help, and hope. For all of this, we express deep lament and sadness.

At this time, we hold those directly impacted in prayer – especially LSSND clients and staff. We look to all of us as Lutherans across North Dakota to consider what this means for our call to love our neighbor. We ask God to lead us in extending the love of Christ in our communities in new ways that will now be even more needed.

As people of faith, Jesus Christ is ever our comforter and our hope. The empty tomb proclaims that death will not have the final say. As we experience this collective loss, we give thanks for the 101 years of impact of Lutheran Social Services of North Dakota in so many lives and we invite you to join us in prayer:

Dear God, in the garden of Gethsemane, Jesus agonized in prayer about the difficult path that lay before him and asked you to "take this cup from me." We, too, as the community of Lutheran Social Services of North Dakota, wish for different circumstances, times that could have spared us from needing to make this decision. Our hearts are heavy. Be with us as we travel this path, guide those who accompany us, and give us peace. With watchful hope, we lean on your mercy and grace. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.

The council approved a new Child Protection policy which includes background checks on staff and volunteers working with youth and vulnerable adults as well as setting expectations for education for Safe Conduct for St. John's.


