If you have been reading my letters over the past several months, you know that I've been encouraging peace, patience and calm. God has reassured us through multiple passages with "do not be afraid". Consider how Job, through all his trials and tribulations, kept his faith and was delivered from his troubles in the end. Amid this Covid-19 pandemic and the recent social unrest, I urge you to keep your faith. These trials, just as all the trials that have befallen mankind before us, will pass. We can always count on God to deliver us from our distress.

As I was standing in my back yard this afternoon with the warm summer sun shining on my face and the gentle breeze bringing the sweet smell of summers' new life to me. I could not help but recall the words of Psalm 118:24;" This is the day that the Lord has made, let us rejoice and be glad in it".

Whither Goes Worship?
Whither is a great old word that simply means "to what place."
You know that you are among language lovers if the Thither,
Thence, Whither, Whence group can be explained. (to that place, from that place, to what place?, from what place?). So to ask the question whither goes worship is to wonder what will worship look

like in the future. Where are we going? And what could it look like when we get there?

We are moving out a reactive phase of worship where we were suddenly jolted into shutting down sanctuary worship and focusing all our energy on supporting the radio broadcast for the community. We simplified our liturgy and welcomed neighboring congregation leaders to lend their voices to the airwaves. Now the Presbyterians and the Congregationalists are resuming worship in their own sanctuaries and St. John's is again able to accommodate a limited number of people at worship. We are back to wondering what makes for authentic, faithful worship for St. John's in the months ahead. Where are we going?

It is important to note a few items- We evaluated offering live streams for worship but quickly recognized that we do not have the infrastructure to do it well. Our internet speed is woefully inadequate and we lack quality cameras and a way to tie into our current sound system easily. We have not given up on the idea, we are just trying to make sure that we do things right. We are contacting companies to see how higher speed internet can be brought to the facility (it is harder (more expensive) than you think because of the sea of concrete around the building). We are imagining how to produce a worship service for broadcast, rather than just film a wide angle of the room. We are wondering about the timeline for implementing changes.

We currently have a 9 am worship service on Sunday that is broadcast live on the radio. We have space for about 40 household units including worship leaders. When we get to a point of having more people wanting to come to the sanctuary, we are seriously considering a Wednesday service as the second service to be added back into the mix. Logistically that would be easier than trying to disinfect the building between two Sunday morning options. Right now, Pr. Lucas and I are considering a regular Wednesday worship service as an integral part of confirmation programming on Wednesdays. One thought is that we would video that service for rebroadcast on Sunday mornings, with some supplemental material.

Living Water for Justice



This has been a chaotic five months and I am ready for this to be over. There has been much loss, unknowing, and shifting outside of any comfort zone. In the last five months, I lost all of you. All the groups and events in which we can connect...put on hold. Unknowing what our communities will look like after Covid-

19 and social injustices staring you in the face and unveiling your own deep brokenness.

What is happening in the Twin Cities in these last couple of weeks once again reminds me of the uncomfortable truth that in our society, we have the "haves" and "have nots" and that even though I have suffered and been disappointed many times, there is no doubt that I received many advantages. It seems like we know and need Jesus more than ever. Throughout Jesus' time they faced a social system that comprised of the "have" and "have nots" that is still here to this day.

In the story of Jesus and the Samaritan women, where a Jew (Jesus) is not supposed to associate themselves with a Samaritan, Jesus says to her in John 4:13-14, "Everyone who drinks of this water will be thirsty again, but those who drink of the water that I will give them will never be thirsty. The water that I will give will become in them a spring of water gushing up to eternal life."

When we are baptized in the baptismal waters of the living God, we are reminded that we are all a part of the body of Christ. When a part of the body is suffering, we too suffer. We all have purpose and a calling to be the light and life to the world.

Overall, we have a long way to go for us to heal the deep wounds that generational racism has caused. Through all of the mixture of emotions of shame and guilt, I am reminded that even though Jesus was in the middle of social unrest, he was still able to show us the love we need to know we are enough and the grace to keep moving forward.

What has been going on in the world IS NOT a movement that "as a predominantly white denomination" we are put in a category of Nazism, KKK or slave owners. Yet, this is a movement of humility and recognition that people have not received the same love and grace from our communities based on the simple distinction of the color of their skin. This is the point where many of us struggle (including myself) and is where our defensive mechanisms kick in. However, I would like to challenge you to pause, take a breath, and listen to why the African American community feels as marginalized from our society decades after the Civil Rights Movement. We will not be able to heal our world overnight. However, recognizing our brokenness, receiving God's grace, listening with each other as Christ's disciples and living out sacrificial love to our neighbor we can strive for justice at peace.



#### Financial Check In

Member giving to support our ministry at St. John's has been steady through the first five months of 2020. We are slightly behind last year in total dollars contributed, but our expenses are significantly lower because of canceled program activities during the pandemic. We are entering the summer with enough cash on hand to not repeat the reduced hours for staff that we implemented last year. Our ability to access the Paycheck Protection Program and to use the funds as they are intended has made many things easier for the council this year.

In mid-March, we had no idea how the congregation would respond. Thank you to everyone who has found a way to continue to share God's abundance with the congregation. We also acknowledge and reach out to those who have seen their household incomes fall because of closed businesses and layoffs over the past few months. Let one of the pastors know if there are ways that St. John's can help you.

We are in conversation about sharing resources with a neighboring congregation in need for the good of the community. #### Council Recap

The council reviewed our current financial life, including modifications to the Paycheck Protection Program that increased the covered period from 8 weeks to 24 weeks. This should allow all of the funds received by St. John's to be eligible for the conversion to a grant.

The council reviewed the first two weeks of sanctuary worship and are satisfied that we are taking appropriate precautions and are safest in continuing to encourage people to worship on the radio.

The council received the Synod Nominating Committee report that named the seven identified candidates for the August Bishop's election (including Rev. Kristina Weber). The council authorized the renewal of the faith formation specialist's position for the coming year. Jennifer Allmer held the position last year and is eligible to continue if she chooses.

The council heard updates on the leadership team conversations with First Congregational United Church of Christ in Jamestown. Our conversations are leaning toward a partnership in ministry through subcontracted pastoral support for worship, administration, and pastoral care.

The Loss Mitigation Report from our insurer was reviewed. The council will evaluate options to make the required safety upgrades to the van or look to replace the van with something new(er). Our current van is 22 years old with 110,000 miles. Additional Loss Mitigation items were turned over to staff to develop and implement. Pr. Erik shared that the annual membership review is underway and will continue through the summer.

Instead of talking about each classroom individually this month I am going to talk about the center as a whole. This last school year was without a doubt a test of our strength as a staff and as a family. We have been through so many changes since January and it has just been a bit of a roller coaster ride.

This year started out like any other year: preschool was in full swing, staff was in their normal classrooms and all was well. During the month of January, we had a fire that shut us down for a few days. Staff had to spend three days cleaning and we had to restructure all of our emergency plans. Enter COVID-19 during the month of February and a full-fledged world panic. During the month of March CIOH nearly operated without a director for a month as I was pulled away to Washington state for a family emergency, and was required to quarantine for 14 days when I got back. In the month of April while I was still in quarantine the state shutdown schools switched to online and preschool was cancelled for the year. Mrs. Ford had to put together a preschool packet to help parents with preschool at home. Then comes May we drove to houses to celebrate our preschoolers who are graduating and moving onto kindergarten, and our center was operating with a total of 13 kids of essential families.

Fast forward to today and with the help of the state emergency grant, and new protocol CIOH is thriving! We are financially stable, our center is full, and everyone is happy and healthy. That is more than I could ever ask for. Things were without a doubt different this year, and I believe we can all pray that next year will be so much better, but we are prepared if they are not. If it wasn't for the staff, their creativity, their flexibility, and their willingness to put our family's needs before their own. We would have never of made it through this disaster of a year.

With all that being said our summer is in full swing, our summer program has started, we had our first water day, we were able to attend kite fest, and we've already eaten tons of popsicles. We are ready to make this summer one for the books.

Our preschool registration is open for the 2020 school year and we are running our 2-day, 3-day, and 5-day programs as usual. If you or someone you know is in need of part-time preschool please send them my way for more information.

We hope everyone has an amazing summer and we will talk to you next month about more of our summer fun!
