Dear friends in Christ,

Chapter three is arguably the most recognized passage from the book of Ecclesiastes. I must admit though that my first exposure to it was not from reading the Bible but rather, listening to "Turn! Turn! Turn!" by the Byrds in December 1965. Their version was actually a remake of the same song by Pete Seeger in 1954. To this day, 55 years later, whenever I hear that song, my memory takes me back to a cold December afternoon on our annual family excursion to the local Christmas tree lot on a quest to find the perfect tree for our living room. It was, and still is, a great song with captivating melody and harmony.

Over time I began to listen more closely to the words and contemplate their meaning. The author of the book of Ecclesiastes is not revealed in the book nor anywhere in the Bible. The book is presented as the musings of the King of Jerusalem as he relates his experiences in life and the lessons that he has drawn from them. The books premise is that all of that actions of human beings are insubstantial, vain, or futile because the lives of all, whether wise or foolish, end in death. In light of this senselessness, he suggests that humans should enjoy and revel in the simple pleasures of daily life such as eating, dancing and taking enjoyment in one's work, which are, after all, gifts from God. The book concludes with the injunction to "Fear God and keep his commandments; for that is the whole duty of everyone".

These are wise lessons to live by. Enjoy the colors of fall for the starkness of winter will follow. Laugh often for surely there will be sorrow. Revel in the warmth of the sunshine on your face for there will be darkness and cold. I know that at times it may be difficult, but we should always try to live our lives the fullest. Take pleasure in the gifts that God has bestowed upon us and praise God for all that we have. In an earlier letter I quoted a line from Psalm 118:24, "This is the day that the lord has made, let us rejoice and be glad in it". That is a fitting verse here as well. After all, we live our entire lives with knowledge that one day it will be over

We Remember

As we begin November, we observe All Saints Sunday. This Feast of the Church is an opportunity to give thanks to God for all the people of faith who live with us now and have died before us. It connects us to the story of God's action in the world and reminds us that our struggles and sorrows as well as our joy and laughter, are connected over time with family and friends, and congregation members.

This year, St. John's has been engaged in a year of Baptismal celebration. At our All Saints Worship on November 1st, we will continue that focus as we invite back all of the people who have been baptized in the past twelve months. At our 9 am worship service, we will read their names, light a candle, and announce the connection to the community of faith to which they belong. We will glimpse the future by naming those who are growing in their faith, even though many are still infants and toddlers.

Our commemoration and recognition of those who have died in the past year will also be observed on All Saints Sunday. At our 10:45 am worship service, we will read the names of our loved ones who have died. There will be an opportunity to light a candle in memory of loved ones, and we will remember the faithfulness of God to every generation.

Part of the prayer of the day on All Saints proclaims to God that, "[You have] knit your people together in one communion...". We are connected to God's saving actions revealed to us in the stories of the Bible through people like Sara and Abraham, Ruth and Naomi, David, John, Peter, and Mary. We are connected to Fred, Rhonda, LaVerne, and Anita. We are connected to Charleigh, Ella, Westin, and Lily. All God's people, living and dead, testify to the goodness and mercy of the God who washes us and claims us in baptism.

Pastors and community leaders continue to look for ways that ritual and remembrance can support us at this time of great uncertainty. We are tired. We sometimes lack the words to name our grief and suffering. Minnesota flies flags at half staff on the 19th of each month as a reminder of those who have died from COVID-19. Pastors in North Dakota are looking for ways to hold vigils outside hospitals with lighted candles that shine in the darkness so that patients know that they are not alone.

God invites us to pour out our wants and needs, our hopes and fears in prayer. As we are washed in the waters of baptism and see the light of candles shine in the darkness, we are connected to the community of saints, living and dead, that show God's faithfulness in the world yesterday, today, and tomorrow.

Instead, we need to turn to the mindset of Christ and make His joy complete by honoring our neighbors.

In Philippians 2:1-4, "Therefore, if you have any encouragement from being united in Christ, if any comfort from his love, if any common sharing in the Spirit, if any tenderness and compassion, then make my joy complete by being like-minded, having the same love, being one spirit and of one mind. Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit. Rather, in humility value others above yourselves, not looking to your own interests but each of you to the interests of others."

When there is fear, anxiety, and an unpredictable future it is easy to lose sight of what is important. God has given us faith and discipleship to be stewards of His love. To know that we should be thankful for the gift of life and that we can shape our world to become a better, healthier, and safer place together. We fix our eyes on Christ, who guides us in hope, healing, and gratefulness in what is to come. Not only may you find yourself leaning on God's love to guide you through the rest of the year, but to help embrace others in that love of Christ.



Discussed cost savings measures.


The new stove and dishwasher have been delivered There is some plumbing and electrical work required The island in the kitchen will need to be moved to facilitate installation.


