UNEXPECTED STRENGTH

Have you ever felt like; "God, I don't know what You are doing? I don't know what to feel and I don't know what to do." Well, I certainly have. And to be completely honest, I was angry. I was angry with God, but I was even angrier with myself for being angry with God. Because I knew that none of what was happening was His fault.

It is easy to become discouraged when you look at what's happening to the world around

us.

Since it was first detected, the Covid-19 pandemic has caused over 36.5 million infections in the US alone, of those more than 633 thousand have died. Now we are seeing a resurgence in cases threatening to undermine the progress we've made.

Nearly 26% of the United States is categorized as being in "extreme drought" conditions. This is having serious consequences on crops and livestock as well as adding to my next bullet point.

As of early August, there were more that 1400 wildfires burning in the lower US, mostly in the Western states. One of them, The Dixie fire NE of San Francisco is poised to become the largest wildfire in California history. It has burned nearly 500,000 acres. To put that into perspective, that's more than 60 times the area of Jamestown. Similar cataclysms are hitting Canada and elsewhere around the world.

I could continue, but I think I've made my point.

I would like to share a little of what I have learned on my walk of faith. God gives unexpected strength when unusual trials come upon us. All the while I have been worrying, the Lord has given me comfort, encouragement, motivation. He has been working behind the scenes to provide his people with the strength, wisdom, and tools to solve their problems. If, as believers we feel burdened when our brothers and sisters suffer, imagine how God feels. Always remember that He loves you and He reminds us repeatedly in His Word that He will never forsake us.

Sometimes we must admit we just don't know and instead of going crazy and trying to find out why, we must trust in the Lord that He knows best. I have often referred to the book of Job because this is made so abundantly clear in the story. One simply needs to read the book of Job to understand my point. Our tribulations are miniscule compared to Job's. The ending, however, puts the power of belief and trust into perspective.

I leave you with the words of Proverbs 3:5 "Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and do not lean on your own understanding."

Partnerships for a Season



At the August council meeting, the council acted to extend St. John's participation in the partnership with English Lutheran in Medina and Trinity Lutheran. This agreement, our 3rd this year, extends the agreement to the end of February 2022. This partnership takes place within wider conversations about how to engage in wider ministry in Stutsman, Logan, Lamoure and Dickey counties. This South Central North Dakota area is our mission field. Lay and Rostered leaders are exploring how to be church together through Atonement, Immanuel, St. John's, and Trinity (all Jamestown), Pingree Lutheran, Woodworth Lutheran, English Lutheran, Medina, St. Luke's, Streeter, Emmanuel, Gackle, Montpelier, Kulm, and Christ the King, Ellendale.

A hard reality in 2021, is that there are not enough pastors to serve congregations the way that they have been served in the recent past. It is expensive to call full time pastors and many of our neighbors are open to partnerships for ministry in a new way. The next few years will be a time of experimentation and trial and error. Our partnership with Trinity and English is structured to provide about 12 hours per week of leadership in Medina this fall. I am taking the role of Confirmation teacher on Wednesday nights. Pr. Kristi is coordinating office hours mid week and council leadership, and all four pastors take turns leading worship at 11 am in Medina. St. John's and Trinity are compensated for the time and travel for this partnership.

Working in partnership with others means that everyone is open to something new. Over the summer, Pr. Lucas led worship in Medina seven times. It is a change for St. John's to have the pastor need to be on the road by 10:10 am to make it to the next service. This fall, with four pastors in the rotation, it will be less noticeable on a Sunday morning. Another adjustment, for the short term, is to have Trinity, St. John's, and English all use the same readings and hymns on a Sunday morning and possibly share some prep work for bulletins and projection. This will be particularly helpful for us at St. John's in the wake of Gem's departure.

Other ideas include a shared position to help all the congregations plan registrations and coordinate travel for the Youth Gathering next summer. We are floating the idea of a shared newsletter for common information with congregation specific pages for each participating congregation. This would help in prep time and would save the smaller congregations some postage (those that don't qualify for bulk mail rates). The paid leaders of the congregations are also looking to take a common continuing education seminar to learn together.

There already are lay leaders taking responsibility for local worship as Synod Authorized Ministers, but there are many areas where experienced, trusted pastors are needed. There is no way that the current pastors in this area can do it all. It is also true that the lay leaders will be vital to the ongoing ministry in towns without a pastor in residence. One hundred years ago, pastors from St. John's supported neighboring congregations by traveling out to lead worship locally in Millarton, Pingree, and Eldridge, among others. St. John's has the resources and stability to be a vital partner with our neighbors.

Nobody is merging. Nobody is taking over, or being taken over. We are all exploring how to be in ministry together to serve the Gospel of Jesus in the area in which we live. We all want to hear the promise that God's work is being done among us with our hands. St. John's knows what it is like to have a long period of waiting to call a new pastor, but the ministry does not stop. Whatever the future holds for staffing within partnerships, we trust that God will lead us and that we do not walk this path alone.

As the first month of school is on our way, my Facebook wall is covered with all the parents taking pictures of their grade school child holding a particular board. We often think of shaping our identity as particularly a young adult

problem, yet everyone faces it at every changing point in our lives. Both trying to meet our personal, social and societal goals is a vital aspect of being human and we perceive that it is the difference in order to be happy.

When I think back on my life, much of my energy was spent on worrying and obsessing what my perceived identity by putting so much weight on what career I was going to choose. Though I still have my mid-life crises to look forward to, I continue asking myself why is it so important to meet every high expectation I have for myself? I think most of us have similar answers to my question, but truth be told, I don't think I have ever been completely satisfied with any expectation I have.

For me my expectations and my faith are in a complicated relationship. Whenever I am in an overwhelming situation or I know my expectations aren't being met, my faith tends not to be in the forefront of my mind. However, when that overwhelming situation passes, I think back, I realize that I didn't need to invest the amount of energy I did worrying about meeting my expectations. More importantly, God is there with me, being present in my life.

When I reflect on where I have been and where I will go, I remind myself that God has given me a particular variety of talents and skills, for me to be enough. I don't have the skills to be a mechanic to work on a vehicle, or do anybody's taxes, but I do have the skills in public speaking and loving a community of believers and leading them in discipleship. I can organize, teach and serve our communities in Christs love and forgiveness. That is what God has called me to do: use my gifts and remember before I ever wrote any prospective career on a board on my first day of school, I am first a beloved child of God. Pr. Lucas

Mid-Year budget review

In January the congregation approved a F/Y 2021 budget that anticipated \$331,523 in income and \$346,421 in expenses. With the financial data available through July, I would predict that we are on a path to a negative cash flow for the year of somewhere between \$10,000 and \$14,000, or about in line with the deficit budget we passed. Thank you to everyone who has maintained their participation in our shared ministry during the first half of the year.

Not included in these numbers are some unexpected maintenance expenses that will need to be paid over the next several months. These include...

Elevator Repairs	\$4,488
Water cooler replacement and plumbing	<u>\$6,000</u>
Total	\$10,488

Our general fund will be able to absorb this deficit this year due to the payroll protection fund grant that we received in 2020. As of the end of July our undesignated general funds available total a moderately healthy \$49,000. (We have enough money in the bank to cover months with lower than expected contributions or when an entire line item in our budget is paid out at one time, like Synod Assembly registrations).

Our budget committee has trimmed our expenses as much as we possible. As the year continues, I will keep you appraised on our progress. In the interim, I urge you give prayerful consideration to how you can help.


