Dear Community of Faith at St. John's Lutheran Church,

Something new is about to happen. Beginning August 1st, Pr. Erik and Pr. Lucas will begin to offer pastoral services at both St. John's and First Congregational United Church of Christ in Jamestown. St. John's has a long history rooted in sharing pastors with neighboring congregations. Most recently, a portion of Pr. Suzi's call was to serve part-time at the University of Jamestown. In 2020, we celebrate the beginning of a new opportunity to be a leader in witness and ministry in Jamestown.

The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America and the United Church of Christ have been full communion partners since 1997. In part this means that these denominations worship together, may exchange clergy and also share a commitment to evangelism, witness and service in the world. In Jamestown, St. John's and First Congregational have served alongside each other for decades by participating in the Jamestown Ministerial Association, hosting Lenten worship and Meals, and in the recent months joining together for radio worship on Sunday mornings.

This partnership does not mean that St. John's and First Congregational are merging. Each congregation remains independent and responsible for their own operations and ministry in the community. Pr. Erik and Pr. Lucas will be the pastors at St. John's and First Congregational while following an agreement between the congregations for an average number of hours per week dedicated to First Congregational worship and ministry.



The next six months are a trial period to iron out expectations and focus on relationship building. At the St. John's Annual Meeting in January, there will be an opportunity to review how things are going. This is good news for First Congregational, who have struggled to find stable pastoral leadership. This is good news for St. John's as we continue our history of providing leadership in Jamestown. We look to the future confident in God's guidance and grace and are called to share God's love with our neighbors.

IT IS WELL, IT IS WELL, WITH MY SOUL

Have you ever been listening to a song and wondered what inspired the author to pen those words? I frequently find myself asking that question. Recently, I was listening to the hymn "It is Well with My Soul" and my curiosity was sparked. I did a little research and I would like to share a brief history lesson with you that, for me, has added new depth and understanding of a hymn that I have known and enjoyed for years.

The words to this song were penned many years ago by Horatio Spafford. Horatio was a wealthy lawyer and real estate investor in Chicago. He and his wife Anna, along with

their son and four daughters, lived a life of philanthropy and service to their church, that is until 1871. In that year he lost his only son to Scarlet Fever. A few months later the Great Chicago fire destroyed most of his real estate holdings. His problems continued when an economic downturn struck in 1873. To raise their spirits, he arranged to travel to Europe with his family aboard the SS Ville du Havre. At the last minute, business kept Horatio from going but he told his family that he would join them soon. Halfway across the Atlantic the Ville du Havre was struck by another ship and sunk rapidly. When his wife finally reached safety, she sent Horatio a two-word telegram;" Saved Alone".

I can scarcely imagine the grief that he must have endured. As Horatio traveled to meet his grieving wife, he spent many hours on the bow of the ship contemplating the plight of his life. As the ship passed near the spot where his four daughters had perished, he penned these words...

When peace like a river, attendeth my way, When sorrows like sea billows roll; Whatever my lot, Thou hast taught me to know It is well, it is well, with my soul.

What is special about this song is that it focuses less on his overwhelming loss and more on where hope can be found through the love of God. This hymn does not minimize the loss and suffering but it proclaims that God is with us always and will be our shelter in the storms of life.

First Peter, chapter 4, verse 19 says: "So then, those who suffer according to God's will commit themselves to their faithful Creator and continue to do good." Horatio's words seem to speak directly to this verse and may even have been his inspiration. Few of us will ever experience the level of pain and sorrow experienced by Horatio Spafford. But we will all experience loss and grief at some time in our lives. When that time comes, will we be able to look up toward Heaven and say," It is well, it is well, with my soul?"

I have done this exercise a couple of times and my reaction every time has been a painful process of reading the letter and wondering, "what in the world was I thinking?" I feel this is one of those times right now where I should write another letter.

As of July 15th, we do not know where we stand with what school will look like for K-12. Then I ask myself how this virus will impact Sunday School, Confirmation, Evangelism Events, German Supper, and Worship Services. How do you plan, when the path in front of you seems unclear? Every person has years that they remember through their life and many of us are not going to want to but we WILL remember the year of 2020 and the chaos this year has brought so far.

In Matthew 11:28-30 Jesus Says, "Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light."

When we are in the middle of conflict, more than ever, we need to remind ourselves that God is present in our lives, even in the times where we are carrying heavy burdens. It is ok to admit to yourselves things are overwhelming and that you need support. Also be honest to yourselves when you are questioning your value at work or at home. We're not called to be superheroes! We are simple called to be Disciples of Christ, which means we aren't called to have the whole weight on our shoulders. We are called to love our neighbor and receive God's grace. As painful as reading those letters I write to myself are, it is humbling when you can tell where the living God is working through relationship in order for me to feel the love I need to keep moving forward.

So when this article comes out, I don't know where the world will be. It might be fine, or I might be facing a new set of guidelines for the way I teach, preach, and offer discipleship to others. All I do know is God will continue to be present in my life, remind me that I have worth, that I am not a superhero, that I am a called to be simply a Disciple of Christ and there is a season for everything.

For now, let us carry each other during this time and reach out in prayer. Prayer for the country, for our school district, and for the decisions of the superintendents, students, and parents will need to make. Prayer for the healthcare workers, small businesses, servers, and all that are in human contact jobs or in living quarters with many occupants that they may see the offerings of hope and light. May we do your will God even in the darkest of corners and through plexi glass barriers...God is greater and continues to give us strength and offer His guiding light.

The small holes in the top roof of the Bell Tower have grown bigger over the past year. We noted this problem in our annual report last January and evaluation and repair costs are now known, but the work is unlikely to be completed before next spring. It will continue to get worse, but is in no real danger of damaging the lower watertight roof unless a 2x12 breaks loose and falls just right. Our bell is mounted on a steel beam and we have no concerns about the bell crashing down.

Also, one of the 35 year old A/C units servicing the Centennial Addition failed this summer. All four units are being replaced.

Council Recap

Torrey Herrington, the Child In Our Hands Director, gave an update to the Council on CIOH operations, staffing, enrollment, and plans for the coming year. This has been a very challenging year, but the center has remained open and currently has 33 of 37 spaces for kids filled.

The Council Approved a Framework of Agreement with First Congregational-United Church of Christ. The agreement lays out the way that First Congregational will sub-contract hours of pastoral services from St. John's. The initial agreement is for six months beginning at 10 hours of pastoral time per week. First Congregational plans to decide on July 26th with the agreement scheduled to begin August 1st.

The council authorized a letter be sent to request comments on the Phase 1 pantry project. All responses are requested by August 11 so the council can consider them and make a decision at their next meeting. The council authorized the purchase of a new stove. Funds are in hand in the Building Fund.

The council authorized the bid to repair the Bell Tower roof for \$36,874. Work will be scheduled as soon as practical, but probably not be completed before next spring. Some Funds allocated in the revised budget passed later in the meeting.

The council authorized returning funds to the Endowment that cannot be used for their intended purpose this year.

The Council appointed two new voting members for the Synod Assembly: Rachel Holsten and Lynn Krueger. They will join Charlotte Freeberg as the lay voting members for the Synod Assembly August 14-16. This year's assembly is an all digital event.

The Council approved the revisions to the 2020 Mission and Ministry Plan.


The Council approved a Van Replacement fund appeal to begin in September.



Greetings and God Bless all,

Yesterday I was able to speak at the church council meeting, so I put together a little something, something to kind of show them an update about CIOH. As I was putting it together I was blown away about some of the facts that was listed on the sheet. Facts that I knew but never took the time to digest and just be proud of how far CIOH has come. Not only through this pandemic, but just as a center. I will list below the things that I shared at the meeting.

Child in Our Hands Preschool & Child Care

- Currently relicensing for our 18th year as a licensed facility. Yes, 18 years I counted all the licenses in the frame. We are one of the oldest and most reputable centers in the Jamestown area.
- We employ 9 wonderful full-time ladies, 1 amazing part time helper, and the best preschool teacher ever! (I may be a bit bias) We have very little turn over which is so awesome!
- Our current enrollment is 33/37 kids. We have a few openings, but will be filling those when we move kids up to their next rooms as they are about to age out of their current rooms.
- During the school year we run an infant room, toddler room, child care room, and 2 or 3 preschool programs depending what enrollment looks like for the year.
- During the summer we run an infant room, toddler room, child care room, and a school aged summer program that we started the summer of 2019.
- This upcoming preschool session we will be running 3 preschool programs. A 2-day, 3-day, and a 5-day program. With only 14 available spots left for all 3 programs combined.
- This past year our focus was figuring out how to maximize our space in order to bring in more money so that we would be able to pay our staff more. It was a bit of an experimental year financially, but we have got it figured out.
- This upcoming year, the plan is just to make it through the year at this point. As well as fine tuning our handbooks, and providing the best care we possibly can.

Of course, this took years of governing mothers, parents, board members, teachers, and directors to make it this far, but that is quite the track record to hold there. We have grown so much over the years it is no wonder our wing is so crazy and wild. But I think I speak for us all when I say we are proud to be a part of the crazy and wild wing of the church. It is a blessing to meet these kids, parents, and families. Help them grow up and watch them hit milestone after milestone. We look forward to seeing what our 18th year has in store for us, we just hope it's a bit normal than this past year!

We also have very few openings left for our 3 preschool programs. If you or someone you know is in need of preschool for the next school year, please reach out for more information.


